Last fall I wrote about why studying abroad is a way of improving your language skills, enjoying new foods and cultural experiences, coming to a deeper understanding of others and perhaps more importantly, a better understanding of yourself. But study abroad and even language study itself may offer some surprises or unexpected "souvenirs."

One of our students studied in Mendoza, Argentina for a year, and became very good friends with a fellow there. They maintained a bi -national, come and go relationship for two years, when the distances and differences became too much. Another studied in Chile, where she became very close to a family and after visits back and forth, married one of their sons. They remain happily married in the U.S. Another student studied abroad, but after graduation moved on to service in Nepal. Yep, you guessed it: she married her Nepalese boyfriend.

I was reminded of these surprising

"recuerdos" of international life when a more recent graduate visited. Jude Krushnowski used a partner program to improve his Spanish. He communicated in Spanish via Internet to his partner, who aided his Spanish while he helped her English. It took four years and many visits back and forth, but on August 30, 2013 Jude married his Peruvian partner, Fiorella Borges Rodríguez. Needless to say, Jude is quite fluent in Spanish now. Though not without challenges, language learning and study abroad may have unexpected rewards...
