The International Society for the Study of Human Ideas on Ultimate Reality and Meaning announces its Seventeenth Biennial meeting for Wednesday, 7:30 p.m, August 5 – Saturday, 1:00 pm, August 8, 2015 at University College, University of Toronto, Toronto, ON Canada.

The Society extends its invitation to professors teaching at universities and experts involved in research in the sciences, social sciences, and humanities to attend the meeting and to participate by presenting papers, commenting on papers, presiding at research sessions as well as organizing and participating in general symposia.

The objective of the meeting is to further research initiated through the journal *Ultimate Reality and Meaning* as well as to facilitate interdisciplinary discourse with respect to the fundamental questions animating all of human thought.

Research Sessions:

Particular topics dealing with how different individuals, people, and systems from the beginning of history until the present contribute to a better and deeper understanding of the ultimate reality and meaning of human existence will be discussed in*Research Sessions*.

General Symposia:

General topics dealing with how Art, Politics, Economics, Science, Philosophy and Religion affect one's efforts to find meaning in his/her world will be discussed in *General Symposia*.

STATEMENT OF VISION AND PURPOSE

The Conference is open to those professors and experts from all parts of the world who have an interest in interdisciplinary research on our effort to find meaning in our world. It is interested in studies dealing with those facts, things, ideas, axioms, persons and values which people throughout history have considered ultimate (i.e., that to which the human mind reduces and relates everything and that which one does not reduce and relate to anything else) or as horizons (i.e., world views in the light of which humans understand whatever they understand) or as supreme value (i.e., for which someone would sacrifice everything and which one would not lose for anything). It covers humanity's entire history, form the earliest pre-literate groupings to contemporary society. Beliefs, world views and conceptualizations of an ultimate reality and meaning of human existence will be identified during the conference and analyzed through the culture they represent and the period from which they were taken. The analytical and critical description of all that the human mind ever thought about the ultimate reality and meaning of human existence is expected to initiate systematic and structural studies of the most universal dynamics that have driven human consciousness from its dawn until the present day.

NOTES FOR PARTICIPANTS

I. BEFORE THE CONFERENCE

By March of 2015 participants will have received the list of research papers submitted for presentation at the sixteenth biennial meeting of U.R.A.M. Each participant is then asked to check six of the essays which he/she would like to read before the meeting and to referee during the meeting. Presentations, which one would like to chair should be marked with a "C". No one will be required to act as referee or chairperson for more than three lectures. The Meeting Committee will honor preferences to the extent possible. It should be understood that a person might be assigned to a topic with which he/she is not familiar in order to promote interdisciplinary dialogue.

By early June of 2015 participants will be informed about the referees for their presentations. At that time each participant is kindly asked to mail one copy of

his/her paper to each of the referees, and one to the Institute. Chairpersons may read papers before the meeting but are not required to do so. Presenters, referees and chairpersons are encouraged to correspond with each other in order to become friends before they meet each other in Toronto or to renew existing friendships already established. Such friendship is one of the many benefits of our meetings, and is often commented on in conference evaluation forms. A printed program indicating the time and place of the presentation will be available at the meeting and its contents will be available prior to it on this URAM "home page" (www.scranton.edu/faculty/uram).

II. DURING THE CONFERENCE

One may wish to take a taxi from Toronto's Pearson International Airport (at more than Can \$30.00) to the conference site at University College in the middle of the University of Toronto campus. Another way to travel into Toronto is by the Airporter Bus service which takes one to the Islington subway station. From there the subway would take one east to the Bay Street station, within walking distance of the site of the conference. A third option would be to travel by car.

The site of the Conference is near the Gardiner Expressway (from the west via Highways 401, 427 or the Queen Elizabeth Way; from the east via the 401 and the Don Valley Parkway) and exit off the Gardiner on Yonge Street North up to 100 Wellesley St. W. at Queen's Park Crescent E. for the conference site on the east end of the University of Toronto campus. One can reach the Comfort Hotel Downtown at 15 Charles St. East (between Yonge and Church St., east of Regis College), or St. Michael's College at 81 St. Mary Street (west of Bay St.).

For each session the assigned room at University College is reserved for 70 minutes: 25 minutes for a presentation, 10 minutes for each referee and 5 minutes for the speaker to respond. During the last 20 minutes the audience shall have a chance to address any member of the panel. Each questioner is asked to limit his/her intervention to 3-4 minutes. There is a 10 minute break between the various presentations of the Congress.

The Task of the Chairperson:

The chairperson is responsible for keeping time and for facilitation of communications.

The Task of the Referee:

The task of the referee is to help the work of the editorial board of the URAM journal. He/she should be guided by three sets of questions:

1. Question of relevance: i.e., do the research and paper deal with the idea of ultimate reality and meaning and promote the stated aims of the URAM project?

2. Question of Completeness, i.e., is the essay of outstanding scholarship and is the idea of URAM being presented adequately explained, or can it be further developed?

3. Question of ultimate context or basic horizon, i.e., general questions of collaborative interdisciplinary discussions bringing to the surface underlying issues regarding approach, methodology, heuristic structures, basic analogies, and fundamental assumptions. In a word, the referee is asked to bring the discussion to the level of radical reflection on ultimates.

Relevant comments by referees may be published in the journal.
