## University Receives Award for Environmental Excellence

Teaching students to "Think Green" has earned The University of Scranton a Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence.

The University was one of just four educational institutions in the state to receive the Governor's Award at a ceremony in Harrisburg on 19 December. In all, 40 awards were presented.

Accepting the award in the Education and Outreach category for the University was Michael C. Cann, Ph.D., Professor of Chemistry. Dr. Cann spearheaded a team of six professors who have developed green chemistry modules that have been woven into existing courses across the chemistry and environmental science curricula at the University. These teaching modules are available to instructors across the globe via the World Wide Web.

"Today's students become tomorrow's scientists," said Dr. Cann. "That's why The University of Scranton teaches chemistry with a top-of-the-mind awareness of pollution prevention."

In 1996, former Governor Tom Ridge introduced the Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence to honor Pennsylvania's leaders in innovative green technologies and environmental management. The awards honor individuals, employees, municipalities and institutions that are working to benefit Pennsylvania's environment and economy.

The University's Green Chemistry program has garnered national and international recognition through presentations made by Dr. Cann and published works in professional journals including *Chemical and Engineering News* and *Green Chemistry*.

## Ignatian Foundations of Higher Education Discussed on Campus

How does Ignatius see the human person? How does Ignatius understand the term "mission"? How are people formed into the Ignatian tradition?

Administrators, faculty and staff of the University explored the answers to these questions during a two-day seminar on 17 and 18 January organized by the Center for Mission Reflection. The seminar was led by the Reverend Howard Gray, S.J., Rector of the Jesuit Community and Assistant to the President for University Mission and Identity at John Carroll University, Cleveland, Ohio.

The University of Scranton is among the first group of Jesuit colleges and universities in the country to participate in Father Gray's conversations about the Ignatian foundation in Jesuit higher education. Father Gray has held similar seminars at Santa Clara University, Santa Clara, Calif., and Ignatius College Preparatory School in San Francisco,

Calif., as well as to the administration and faculty of five institutions of higher learning in the Philippines.

Among those who attended the seminar held in Brennan Hall was Joseph Dreisbach, Ph.D., Dean of the Colleges of Arts and Sciences.

"The seminar confirmed that the University is very sensitive to the Jesuit mission," said Dr. Dreisbach. "But there are always ways to do it better and to expand our mission to the community and beyond."

Over the course of the two days, Father Gray made three presentations followed by reflections and case studies.

The first presentation involved discussions about the Ignatian understanding of the human person in education, based on Jerome Nadal's *spiritu, corde, et practice*: inspired by the spirit, from the heart, pastorally.

The second presentation addressed "the Ignatian mission: its history and significance today."

## Events Commemorate Martin Luther King Day

The University of Scranton community participated in several events in honor of Martin Luther King Day.

The Martin Luther King Scholarship dinner was held on 19 January. Awards were presented to two students of African-American or Hispanic descent who are high school graduates from Lackawanna County. The recipients of this scholarship are Steven Rogers, a graduate of Scranton Prep, now attending The University of Scranton; and Amarity Daniel, a graduate of Bishop Hannan High School, now attending the University of Pittsburgh. This event was

sponsored by The University of Scranton, the Council for Community Affairs and United Colors of the University. Judge Robert A. Mazzoni attended as the guest speaker.

On 21 January the University presented a series of videos in honor and celebration of a "Historical Perspective of Dr. Martin Luther King." The University's Office of Multicultural Affairs sponsored this event, which was held in the Eagan Auditorium of the Gunster Student Center.

A breakfast sponsored by the African American Arts of Alliance was held at the Radisson Hotel on 21 January. Ronald J. Felton, President of NAACP, was guest

speaker. Later in the day, various speakers discussed black history at the Bethel A.M.E. Church. Among the speakers was Jo Ann Ustry, the University's Director of the Office of Equity and Diversity.

During Black History Month in February, the University's Performing Arts Series in conjunction with United Colors will present "The Gully Low Jazz Band - Louis Armstrong, The Second Century!" on 15 February in the Houlihan-McLean Center. (*See Campus Calendar for details.*)

Black History Month was first launched from Negro History Week in 1926 to combat ignorance and intentional distortion of black history.

# Santa Clara President to Receive Arrupe Award

Paul L. Locatelli, S.J., President of Santa Clara University, will be presented the sixth annual Pedro Arrupe, S.J., award for Distinguished Contributions to Ignatian Mission and Ministries. The award will be presented at the University Assembly on 11 February at 3 p.m., in the Executive Center (5th floor) of Brennan Hall. The University community is encouraged to attend the Assembly.

The Arrupe Award is named in honor of the late Very Rev. Pedro Arrupe, S.J., the Superior General of the Society of Jesus from 1965 to 1983. The University instituted the award in 1996 to further its namesake's vision by recognizing men and women for outstanding contributions in a wide variety of Ignatian-inspired ministries.

Previous recipients of the Arrupe Award are: Kathleen Haser, Executive Director of the Jesuit Volunteer Corps, East; Paul C. Reinert, S.J., Chancellor, St. Louis University; Dorothy M. Brown, Ph.D., Provost, Georgetown University; Vincent O'Keefe, S.J., Superior, America House and former General Assistant of the Society of Jesus; and Monica Hellwig, Ph.D. President, ACCU.

For all but two of the past 24 years, Fr. Locatelli has served Santa Clara University. He joined Santa Clara in 1974 as a faculty member in the Accounting Department. In 1976, he was named Associate Dean of Business. He was appointed Academic Vice President in 1978 and continued to serve in this post until 1986.

In 1986, Fr. Locatelli left Santa Clara to join Loyola Marymount as Rector and Professor of Accounting. He returned to Santa Clara to become its President in 1988.

Numerous prestigious awards have recognized his contributions to higher education. In 2000, he was presented with the Education Achievement award from the Italian American Heritage Foundation and was named to the Junior Achievement Business Hall of Fame. In 1999, he received the John Gardner Leadership Award from the American Leadership Forum and the Citizen of the Year (Medici Medal) from the County of Santa Clara/Province of Florence – Sister County Commission.

Fr. Locatelli is currently a Board member of the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities and served as Chair of the board from 1994 – 2000. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley, as well as the Institute of International Education of Students. Fr. Locatelli is an Executive Committee member of the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities.

## Alumni and Students Staff Clinic in Haiti

Four Scranton alumni and two current students volunteered for a mission trip to Haiti in January. The doctors and pre-med students staffed a remote medical clinic for one week.

Senior Christopher Jones and junior Stephanie Tessing accompanied alumni Richard Bevilacqua, M.D., D.M.D., '83, Jean-Paul Bonnet, D.O., '76, Gregory Lynch, D.O., '79, and Terence Lonergan, M.D., '89.

The trip was sponsored by the University's Medical Alumni Council. Medical supplies for the trip were donated, and the participating physicians paid their own travel expenses. The students' travel expenses were paid for through donations made by the University's medical alumni.

This is the first of several service trips planned for the year by the Medical Alumni Council, an affiliate of the University's 38,000-member National Alumni Society.

Robert E. Fetterhoff

Robert E. Fetterhoff, Registrar, died 7 December, 2001, at his home in Clarks Summit. He and his wife, the former Marie Schwartz, celebrated their 20th

wedding anniversary on 27 December 2000.

"Bob was a man who took the Gospel to heart and who, by living the message of the Gospel, made that message come alive for all who knew him," said University President Joseph M. McShane, S.J. at the funeral homily. "Through his loving actions, he made it possible for all who knew him to believe in the God of life."

Mr. Fetterhoff was born in Reading, and was a graduate of Trinity High School, Camp Hill. He received his bachelor of arts degree in English from Fordham University, Bronx, N.Y., and undertook graduate studies at West Chester University.

He joined the University as Registrar in 1996. His tenure was marked by dramatic enhancements in the use of technology to improve service to students, including the first use of telephone and later on-line registration for courses. He was Chairman of the commencement committee and Editor of the *Undergraduate Catalog*.

Prior to joining the University, he was registrar of Roger Williams College, Bristol, R.I., registrar of Cabrini College, Radnor, and registration coordinator at West Chester University, West Chester.

He was a member of Our Lady of the Snows Church in Clarks Summit, the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, Middle States Association of Collegiate Registrars and Officers of Admissions and the Conference of the Registrars in Jesuit Institutions.

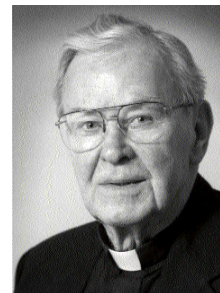
His happiest moments were quiet times with his family. "He found happiness in the happiness of his children, which is the most generous form of parental love," Bill Fetterhoff said in his brother's eulogy. He especially loved nature and the ocean.

Also surviving are a daughter, Sarah, and a son, Stefan; three sisters, Mary Judd and Margaret Hess, both of Camp Hill, and Therese Manuel, Gloucester, Va.; a brother, William, Camp Hill; and nieces and nephews.

Edward R. Powers, S.J.

Rev. Edward R. Powers, S.J., 87, died on 11 January in Flourtown.

A native of Pittsburgh, Fr. Powers entered the Society of Jesus at the Novitiate of

Saint Isaac Jogues in Wernersville, in February of 1933. He received a bachelor of arts and master of arts degrees from Boston College and licentiate in philosophy and sacred theology from Weston College, Mass. Ordained to the priesthood in 1945 by Bishop T.A. Emmet, S.J., he pronounced his final vows in the Society of Jesus on 2 February 1950.

Fr. Powers joined the staff at Georgetown University in 1948 as assistant director of seismology. In 1951, he was appointed Georgetown's physical plant administrator. In the role, he was responsible for ensuring proper maintenance of all campus facilities.

In 1954, he helped the Jesuits in their efforts to establish Wheeling Jesuit College, Wheeling, W. Va., serving as buyer and treasurer.

In 1955, Fr. Powers joined the faculty of The University of Scranton as an assistant professor of mathematics. A rigorous but devoted professor, Fr. Powers would offer additional class time on Saturdays for students who needed extra help. He taught on the faculty until 1985, rising to the rank of professor. In 1984, he was named professor emeritus of mathematics.

Fr. Powers was a member of the University's Board of Trustees from 1958 to 1970, serving as secretary from 1969-1970. Active in campus life, Fr. Powers served as a member of the University's Admissions Committee. He also belonged to several professional organizations.

The son of the late Edward and Margaret Frey Powers, he was preceded in death by brothers Lawrence, James and George and by sisters Margaret Schenk, Loretta Fischer and Helen Zwigart.

## Ignatian Foundations of Higher Education Discussed

"The mission is the enterprise that furthers the kingdom preached by Christ," said Father Gray. "This kingdom is characterized by justice, peace and love."

Relating the Ignatian mission to The University of Scranton, Marie A. George, Ph.D., Vice President of Planning and Institutional Research said, "We need diversity in our community, but there also needs to be a core of people who are actively committed to the mission of the University - education in the Ignatian tradition."

"Mission is a 'sending forth'," added Dr. George. "It's not static. It's something we are continually called to do."

In the world of higher education, part of the sending forth involves the formation of people - particularly students - into the Jesuit tradition. This topic was the focus of Father Gray's final presentation on Ignatian formation. Participants discussed how educators can help students become "people of the kingdom" through knowledge, communication and good example.

Kelli O'Brien, a first-year Instructor of Theology at the University, said she found these discussions "concrete and applicable to the classroom."

"Inspiration is when you find - as if from above - that you've been given a moment of understanding," said Ms. O'Brien. "You can't make a student come to that moment when everything is clear.

However there are things you can do to create an environment that helps students come to that moment."

Father Gray is well-known in Jesuit circles for his many contributions to higher education. For five years before joining John Carroll University, he served as Director for Ignatian Spirituality at Boston College. While at Boston College, he was also Project Director for the Lilly Endowment Planning Program on the theological exploration of vocation.

Father Gray is a Board member of Georgetown University, Walsh Jesuit High School, the Jesuit Retreat House, Cleveland, and the *National Catholic Reporter*. Four of his essays have been published as chapters of books.

# Annual Fund Exceeds \$2.1 Mil. Goal

## STUDENT-ATHLETES MAKE HEADLINES

Even though fall sports have been over for nearly three months, a number of student-athletes continue to make headlines, the most notable being **Sara Suchoski (Wilkes-Barre/Coughlin)**, a forward on the women's soccer team who was named first-team all-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

She was the only freshman among the 33 players honored.

"She had an outstanding season," said Royals' women's soccer coach Joe Bochicchio, who is second all-time in Division III history with 231 career victories. "This is an incredible honor for anyone, let alone a freshman. This is the culmination of a great season."

Suchoski tied the Royals' single-season record with 24 goals. In addition, her 59 total points were the second highest single-season total in Scranton history and her 11 assists was tied for third. She also led the team in game-winning goals (8) en route to earning the Freedom Conference Rookie of the Year award. Scranton finished with a 17-4-1 overall record, which included its third straight Freedom Conference title and third consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. The Royals also advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA championships for the second time in University history.

Suchoski becomes the seventh player and first freshman in Scranton history to earn all-America honors in women's soccer. The other six are **Sue Cately (1987)**, **Holly S piech (1988, 1989, 1990)**, **Monica D avidson (1989)**, **Renee Zizza (1992)**, **Nicole Amato (1999)**, and **Nicole Bayman (2000)**.

Suchoski wasn't the only soccer player to earn national recognition. Senior defender **Eric Kunzinger (Smithtown, N.Y./St. Anthony's)** was named third-team men's scholar all-American by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA)/adidas.

Kunzinger, a two-time all-Freedom Conference selection, holds a 3.3 cumulative grade point average in management with a minor in finance. He is also a member of the 2001 Middle Atlantic Conference Academic Honor Roll for fall sports.

He was an integral part of a Royal defensive unit that held six opponents scoreless and allowed an average of less than two goals a game. Despite playing in the back and missing three matches due to an injury, Kunzinger still managed to finish sixth on the team in scoring with two goals. He also had the game-winning goal in a 2-0 victory

over Penn State-Altoona on Saturday, September 29, at Fitzpatrick Field.

Kunzinger was also named third-team all-regional by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) following the 2000 season.

### ICE HOCKEY

Veteran Head Coach Bill Fitzgerald earned his 75th career victory by leading the Ice Royals to a 3-2 victory over Rutgers University in Eastern Collegiate Hockey Association (ECHA) action on 11 January in New Jersey.

Scranton also reached the 10-win plateau for the fourth time in the last five years. The Ice Royals need to win seven of their last nine games to break the single-season record for victories, which was set during the 1997-1998 season when Scranton went 16-8.

After a 3-7 start in which nine of those games were played on the road, the Royals have turned things around by winning three of their first four Freedom Conference games to remain in a first-place tie in the league.

Junior center **Derek Elphick (Dingmans Ferry/Delaware Valley)** became the 32nd player in Scranton history to score more than 1000 career points when he tossed in 20 points in a 68-62 victory over King's College on 12 January at the Long Center. Elphick has been getting plenty of support from freshman guard Ryan Rogan (**Archbald/Scranton Prep**) and junior guard **Dan Loftus (Doylestown/Central Bucks**

**West**), both of whom are averaging in double figures so far this season.

The Royals will also enjoy home court advantage through the rest of the year, as five of their final nine games will be played at the Long Center.

### SWIMMING

Coach Tomm Evans' Royals and Lady Royals are focusing their training regiments to be in tip-top shape for the 2002 Middle Atlantic Conference championships, which will be held at Widener University in Chester, 15-17 February.

Seniors **Mike Burns (Brooklyn, N.Y./Xavier)**, **Tim Herbert (Dallas/Dallas)** and **Rob Steffenauer (Bloomsburg/Central Columbia)** have provided leadership and experience to a relatively young lineup.

Junior **Jill Hamnett (Newtown/Council Rock)** and sophomores **Kristen Best (Swedesboro, N.J./Kingsway Regional)** and **Jayne Smith (Cherry Hill, N.J./Cherry Hill East)** have been instrumental in leading the Lady Royals to a winning record so far this season. Best broke her own record in the 1000 freestyle in a time of 11:02.21 as Scranton posted a 108-70 win over Susquehanna University on 12 January at the Byron Complex.

The Lady Royals are once again recognized as one of the finest teams in the nation. Ranked as high as 9th by d3hoops.com this year, Scranton appears to be on the verge of winning 20 games for the 11th straight season. Pretty impressive for a

team that features eight freshmen and four sophomores among its 16 players.

Sophomore guard **Kate Pierangeli (Springfield/Springfield)** has garnered a number of accolades so far this year after leading the team in the following statistical categories: scoring (15.7), minutes played (33.6), free throw percentage (.759), assists (4.5) and steals (2.9). Junior forward **AnneMarie Russo (Brooklyn, N.Y./Bishop Kearney)** continues to be the Lady Royals' top inside threat, contributing 12.7 points and 6.8 rebounds a game.
