## Commencement Speakers Announced

### Five to Receive Honorary Degrees during Commencement 2002

Lisa Myers, Chief Congressional Correspondent for NBC News, will give the principal address at the University's 102nd undergraduate commencement to be held Sunday, 26 May at the First Union Arena at Casey Plaza, Wilkes-Barre.

Avery Cardinal Dulles, S.J., the Laurence J. McGinley Professor of Religion and Society at Fordham University, will deliver the principal address at the University's Graduate School commencement to be held Saturday, 25 May in the Byron Complex on campus.

Ms. Myers, who is a senior member of NBC's award-winning political team, reports on the nation's government for all of NBC News broadcasts, including "The Nightly News with Tom Brokaw," "Dateline NBC" and "Today." She is a regular contributor to NBC's "Fleecing of America" news segment and routinely participates as a member of the roundtable discussion group of "Meet the Press."

Critically praised for her work as a reporter, Ms. Myers received a Hess Report for campaign coverage in 2000 and was a contributor to the "Nightly News" broadcast given the Edward R. Murrow Award for Best Newscast for its broadcast the day following the November 2000 election. The University will present Ms. Myers with an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters at the undergraduate commencement ceremony.

An internationally known author and lecturer, Cardinal Dulles has written over 650 articles and has published 21 books on theological topics. He was created a Cardinal of the Catholic Church on 21 February 2001, by Pope John Paul II and thus became the first U.S. theologian named to the College of Cardinals.

Cardinal Dulles is currently a consultant to the Committee on Doctrine of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and an associate fellow of the Woodstock Theological Center in Washington, D.C. Cardinal Dulles has an impressive collection of awards, including Phi Beta Kappa, the Croix de Guerre, the Cardinal Spellman Award for distinguished achievement in theology and the Boston College Presidential

Bicentennial Award. At the University's Graduate School commencement, Cardinal Dulles will be presented with an honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. He holds 21 other honorary degrees. During Commencement 2002, three other individuals will be presented with honorary degrees. At the undergraduate commencement ceremony, Msgr. Santiago Mendez Bravo, President of Universidad del Valle de Atemejac (UNIVA), headquartered in Guadalajara, Mexico, will be presented an honorary degree of Doctor of Pedagogy; and Congressman John Murtha will receive an honorary degree of Doctor of Law. Sr. Anne Munley, I.H.M., President of the Congregation of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, will be presented with an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters at the Graduate School commencement.

In his role as President of UNIVA, Msgr. Santiago Mendez Bravo, directs a university with whom The University of Scranton has a formal agreement that promotes exchanges of faculty and students. He is currently and has been an advisor for numerous organizations and associations, including the InterAmerican

Universities Organization, the Federation of Mexican Private Institutes of Higher Education and the Mexican Association of Christian Further Education Institutes. Sister Anne Munley is one of two delegates from the United States to the International Union of Superiors General (UISG). She served as the facilitator of the UISG 2001 Plenary and as chairperson of the plenary planning committee which represents nearly one million women religious from five continents. She has also served for three years as President of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious.

Congressman John Murtha represents Pennsylvania's 12th Congressional District. In 1974, he became the first combat Vietnam veteran elected to Congress. Congressman Murtha is a national leader on defense, health care and social issues and is a Member of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee. He is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Panetta Institute's Jefferson Lincoln Award for Bipartisan Leadership and the Pennsylvania Chamber of Business and Industry's Government Leader of the Year.

## Scranton Alumni Community Launched Online

Connecting with former classmates just got a whole lot easier, thanks to the new Scranton Online Alumni Community launched 1 May.

The online community offers such features as an online directory of Scranton alumni, permanent e-mail and professional resources including career postings and yellow page listings of alumni.

"This free and exclusive online community is available to all 38,000 alumni of The University of Scranton," said Robert P. Zelno, Director of Alumni Relations. "It is a resource that we believe will have great appeal and great value to alumni who want to stay connected with their classmates and their alma mater."

Alumni who register for the service receive a free, permanent e-mail address. "Even if you change jobs or e-mail providers, your e-mail address with the University will stay the same," said Mr. Zelno.

Users can search for fellow alumni using the online directory, which lists personal and professional information as posted by Scranton graduates. Alumni can also post and review news and events by submitting a Class Note to the site. Message boards and chat rooms provide an opportunity for online users to post and read messages, share ideas and join in real-time discussions.

The site also contains areas for professional networking. Through the Career



Center, alumni can post jobs or resumes, become part of mentoring programs at the University, or get career counseling. The site's yellow pages provide opportunities for alumni to promote their products and services, or search for those advertised by other Scranton alumni and members of other online communities, nationwide.

The Events Calendar lists activities sponsored by the Alumni Society, its affiliates and any of its 20 chapters, as well as University-wide events.

## University Names Brian Carpenter, Ph.D. CASE Professor of the Year

The University of Scranton named Brian W. Carpenter, Ph.D., its CASE Professor of the Year in recognition of his outstanding performance as a member of the University's faculty.

Professors awarded by individual schools are then eligible for further recognition by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) at the state and national levels.

Dr. Carpenter, who resides in South Abington Township, joined the accounting faculty at The University of Scranton in 1987. He served as chairperson of the Accounting Department from 1992 to 1998 and was promoted to full professor in 1998.

Dr. Carpenter also received the Kania School of Management's Scholarly Achievement Award in 2001, the Kania School of Management's Alperin Teaching Fellowship in 1999 and the Alpha Sigma Nu University Award for Teaching Excellence in 1990. He was named the Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants' Outstanding Educator in 1997.

He is a member of the American Accounting Association and the Institute of Management Accountants.

Dr. Carpenter has published numerous articles in scholarly journals. Dr. Carpenter has also co-authored accounting textbooks and was co-editor of the American Accounting Association's *Handbook for Accounting Administrators*.

He earned a doctorate in accounting from Pennsylvania State University, where he also earned a bachelor's degree. Dr. Carpenter earned an MBA degree from The University of Scranton in 1982.

Prior to joining Scranton's faculty, Dr. Carpenter taught at Lehigh University and Pennsylvania State University.

CASE is an international association of colleges and universities, and independent elementary and secondary schools.

CASE began the Professor of the Year competition in 1981 to recognize faculty members for extraordinary commitment to undergraduate teaching, for contributions to the lives and careers of students, and for service to their institutions and the teaching profession.

## University Appoints New Dean of Graduate School

Duncan M. Perry, Ph.D., has been named Dean of the Graduate School and Director of Research at the University effective 1 July.

Dr. Perry is currently the Dean for Graduate Studies and Extended Programs at Millersville University, Millersville. He was previously Dean for Graduate Studies and Research and Professor of History at Central Washington University, Ellensburg, Wash.

Upon the invitation of Radio Free Europe, he served as a Senior Balkan Analyst in Munich, Germany, and later founded the Open Media Research Institute in Prague, in the Czech Republic.

He previously served as the Graduate Dean at the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks, N.D., Assistant Dean for Graduate Studies at the University of Maryland, College Park, Md.; and Personnel Officer and Director of Graduate Academic

Records at the H.H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

"Dr. Perry brings to the University a broad base of experience that will be pivotal to the University's efforts to further enhance its Graduate School," said Beth E. Barnett, Ed.D., Provost and Academic Vice President of the University.

Dr. Perry's impressive record of scholarship has focused primarily on Eastern Europe, and includes books and articles on issues facing the Balkans. Among his numerous scholarly awards and fellowships are a Woodrow Wilson Center Research Fellowship in its Eastern European Program, two Fulbright awards for study in Bulgaria and two fellowships from the Bulgarian Academic Sciences.

"I am sure that the depth of Dr. Perry's academic and practical experience in the area of international programming will prove to be an enormous asset to the University and its more than 100 international students," said Dr. Barnett.

Dr. Perry holds a bachelor's degree in History and Political Science from Davis and Elkins College in Elkins, W. Va; master's degrees in Russian Language and Linguistics and also in European History from Ohio University, Athens, Ohio; and a doctorate in Balkan History from the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

The Graduate School at The University of Scranton offers 21 master's programs in the areas of healthcare, education, business, research, counseling, human resources, chemistry, computers and technology. The University's graduate programs are accredited by the most rigorous accrediting organizations, including AACSB International, the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

## Parking Office Announces Online Applications for Parking Permits

Through a new, streamlined service, members of the University community can obtain their 2002-2003 parking permit online. Users enter an ID and PIN to access the application.

Faculty, staff and students who currently have a parking sticker will only need to verify information and payment online and will not need to provide a copy of a vehicle registration card unless they have changed vehicles. Members of the University community who do not have easy access to a computer can complete the online process at the Parking and Public Pavilion.

"We are pleased to offer the University community with an easier way to secure their parking permits," said Richard Pomager, Director of Public Safety.

Payment options will continue to be cash, check or payroll deduction

### Faculty/Staff Registration

Faculty and staff members will receive an e-mail in early June that includes a link

to the online system. In order to reduce conflicts with student processing, the Parking Office is asking faculty and staff to complete online registration by 15 July. Faculty and staff will continue to receive their permits through the mail. Permits are effective upon receipt and are required beginning the first day of classes.

### Student Registration

Students will receive an e-mail with a link to access the online system during the summer. Day school students can apply in early July. Undergraduate student permits will be available for express pickup in the Byron Complex during Royal Welcome the weekend of 24 and 25 August 2002.

Graduate and Dexter Hanley College students will have access to the system beginning on 21 July 2002 and will continue to receive their permits by mail.

The projected deadline for student applications is 12 August 2002.

# Scranton Faculty Selected to Teach MBA Courses in China

Scranton, Shanghai and Beijing might seem like an unlikely mix in the world of higher education – unless you happen to be a University of Scranton faculty member who is teaching an MBA course in China.

Through a program sponsored by a consortium of Jesuit universities, as well as an independent affiliation established by The University of Scranton, faculty members from the Kania School of Management have been invited to teach MBA courses in China during the summer semester.

In the summer of 2001, Satya Chattopadhyay, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Marketing/Management, was selected as one of a handful of faculty members from 26 Jesuit universities to teach a summer MBA program as part of the Beijing International MBA (BiMBA) Program held on the campus of Peking University in Beijing. This summer, Cynthia Cann, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Management/Marketing, will be one of a small group of faculty members from Jesuit universities teaching in Beijing.

The connection between The University of Scranton and China is further enhanced by an independent arrangement established through the efforts of Alan Brumagim, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Marketing/Management. Last summer, Dr. Brumagim and Wayne Cunningham, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Operations and Information Management, team-taught an MBA course at Tongji University in Shanghai. This summer, Nabil Tamimi, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Operations and Information Management, will teach an MBA course at the Tongji University.

These foreign teaching experiences translate into professional enrichment of faculty who share their real-life experiences of international business with students on two continents.

“Faculty are the key link to students,” said Ronald Johnson, D.B.A., Dean of the Kania School of Management. “If faculty, because of their experiences, talk about things going on elsewhere in the world, students will be more inclined to broaden the horizons of their thinking.”

Chinese students have the opportunity to learn about American business practices. Students in the BiMBA program also earn an MBA from Fordham University.

Back on American ground, students at The University of Scranton have an opportunity to learn about the economic development of China, whose economy has grown faster than any other nation in the world over the past two decades.

Reflecting on his teaching experiences at Tongji University, Dr. Brumagim said, “When you get to experience a new culture, it helps you to see things that you

might have taken for granted. My teaching experience in China gave me an appreciation for just how good we have it in the United States.”

Dr. Brumagim first established contacts with Tongji University while conducting general project management training in China for the Project Management Institute (PMI) in 2000. The training was part of PMI’s project management professional certification that was being offered in China for the first time.

## Royden B. Davis, S.J.

Rev. Royden B. Davis, S.J., 78, died 2 April in Scranton.

Fr. Davis served in the U.S. Army from 1943 to 1945 as a gunner in an anti-aircraft battery.

He began a distinguished career at Georgetown University in 1965 when he was named Dean of freshmen and Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. In 1966, he was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, a post that he would hold until 1989.

At Georgetown, Fr. Davis welcomed women students to the College of Arts and Sciences in 1969. He oversaw the inauguration of the American Studies Program, the expansion of the Fine Arts Department, the establishment and growth of the Psychology

Department, and the creation of the Sociology and Computer Science departments. In 1989, he directed Georgetown’s Foreign Studies Program in Florence, Italy, and, in 1990, served as Chair of the Ignatian Anniversary.

In 1991, Fr. Davis returned to The University of Scranton, where he taught briefly in the 1950s, to serve as Rector of the Jesuit Community at Scranton. In this role, he was a member of the Board of Trustees of The University of Scranton and Scranton Preparatory School.

At the conclusion of his service as rector in 1997, he remained at the University as an Associate Campus Minister and

Chaplain of the Panuska College of Professional Studies. He also served as a critical member of the President’s Task Force on Ignatian Mission and Identity.

In 1985, he received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Georgetown University, and, in 1992, he had an endowed chair in interdisciplinary studies named in his honor.

In 1997, The University of Scranton presented Fr. Davis with the Pedro Arrupe, S.J., Award for Ignatian Mission and Ministries, which recognizes persons who have made significant contributions to the Ignatian mission.

“What best exemplified the person of Fr. Davis was the way he truly lived his Ignatian Spirituality,” said Paulette

Burton, a member of the Women’s Renewal Group led by Fr. Davis. “He indeed could see God in all things and he shared this beautiful vision of Him with everyone he had the opportunity to meet.”

“Roy Davis was a tower of strength ... but in the gentlest way,” said Brendan G. Lally, S.J., Rector of the Jesuit Community at Scranton, at Fr. Davis’ funeral mass. “Roy, thank you for helping us see the infinite possibilities and for your holy and gentle heart which helped make those possibilities so attractive.”

## A SPOTLIGHT ON RESEARCH

Abstracts from five poster presentations

**PAUL M. RUTKOWSKI**, Biology  
Timothy J. Cadigan, S.J., Ph.D., Biology  
"The Effect of Acid Mine Drainage on Bioproductivity in the Lackawanna River"

The Lackawanna River in Northeastern Pennsylvania is heavily polluted by several large influxes of acid mine drainage (AMD). This project is a first examination of the effects of AMD on the bioproductivity of the river – specifically, to see if the main chlorophyll producers, the algae, are adversely effected by changes brought about by AMD.

Replicate sets of ceramic tiles were placed in the river at two sites; one in relatively fresh water and the other in heavily AMD polluted waters. The tiles were collected from the riverbed and replaced by new tiles every two-weeks from June until late October 2001. Bioproductivity was gauged by two parameters; average organic biomass, measured as ash-free dry mass (AFDM), and average chlorophyll a content. On average, greater bioproductivity occurred in the AMD contaminated waters as measured by chlorophyll a, but not by AFDM.

**VERONICA VALLEJO**, History

"Public Inspection of Private Lives: Domestic Violence in Mexico, 1750-1850"

Primary research was conducted on domestic violence at Mexico City's Archivo General de la Nación during July 2001. This research was conducted as part of the

University's Faculty-Directed Student Summer Research Program.

Among their conclusions, the researchers found that judges frequently looked for mitigating circumstances in order to lessen a husband's punishment for having disciplined his wife more severely than socially acceptable. The researchers also analyzed references to love and affection in these documents as a vehicle to understand gendered household responsibilities. Ms. Vallejo and Dr. Penyak recently delivered a joint paper on "Domestic Violence in Colonial Mexico" at Caldwell College, N.J.

**HUSAIN BOOTWALA**, Finance  
John N. Kallianiotis, Ph.D., Economics/Finance  
"Expected Inflation and Real Risk-free Rate of Interest"

This paper tries to determine two very important components of the price of capital (interest rate), the expected inflation and the real risk-free rate of interest, by using behavioral (utility) and central-bank's (Fed's) target (ultimate objective) functions. It develops the final model through a division of the economy into two different states (ideal and riskless) based on expected inflation.

The model measures first the time preference for consumption and the rate of return on productive assets to determine real risk-free rate of interest and then, the expected money supply growth which depends on central bank's targets and uses

this anticipated and unanticipated money growth together with an augmented Phillips curve to determine expected inflation. The theoretical work uses 23 equations and a specification; a testing of them is pursued at the end. The results show a very strong Fisher effect of money supply on interest rates.

**JACLYN LOEW**, Occupational Therapy

"The Effect of Poetry Therapy on the Self-Esteem and Life Satisfaction of Nursing Home Residents"

Utilizing a multi-method approach to research, this study employs qualitative fieldnotes and two quantitative assessment tools, the Life Satisfaction Index and the Rosenberg Self-Esteem Scale, as pre-tests and post-tests. Conducted over the period of eight weeks, a one-hour poetry group was held once per week with 11 residents of a local nursing home. The group was conducted by the advisor of this research project, who has experience in facilitating poetry groups in this population.

After analysis of data sources seven findings were deemed significant as supported by qualitative data. Significant themes that emerged in support include: increase in social interactions, reminiscence, and the benefits of group dynamics. The findings suggest that self-esteem and life satisfaction are important issues in the lives of nursing home residents. Most participants exhibited improvement in these areas resulting from group involve-

ment, not necessarily from the art of poetry. An increase in positive behavior was observed by the researcher as well as outside observers within the nursing home staff.

**CATHERINE COFFEY, ANNE FUSCO, MARY LEBER, and KIMBERLY VIGLIOTTA**, Nursing  
Dona Carpenter, BSN, MSN, Ed.D. Nursing  
"Female College Students' Knowledge Regarding Body Image Disorders"

The purpose of this study was to describe the knowledge female college students have on the subjects of nutrition and body image disorder. There is a limited amount of research available specific to the college-age female's view of her body and subsequently why she has this view.

This investigation focused on three major influences that contribute to a college female's perception of what body type is accepted by today's society. These influences have been organized into the following categories: social, psychological, and physical.

This quantitative, descriptive research study was modeled around the Azjean and Fishbein Theory of Reasoned Action (TRA). One hundred ten college females between the ages of 18 and 21 participated. Convenience sampling was used to administer the sampling tool, a 22-item multiple-choice questionnaire. The conclusions developed based upon the research results can be applied to college-age female populations at universities to develop focused educational programs on nutrition and body image.

## 20th Annual Gelb Lecture Slated

The University of Scranton's 20th Annual Morris Gelb Lecture will feature award-winning writer and professor Samuel Heilman. The lecture is open to the public free of charge.

Mr. Heilman will present "Jewish Community; A Spectrum of Alternatives" on 9 May, at 8 p.m., in the Eagen Auditorium of the Gunster Student Center on campus.

Mr. Heilman is the author of eight books and numerous articles and reviews. In May 2001, the University of California Press published *When a Jew Dies*, an anthropological analysis of Jewish death, bereavement and mourning. It was the winner of the 2001 Koret Foundation Book Award in Jewish Thought.

Mr. Heilman holds the Harold Proshansky Professorship in Jewish Studies and Sociology at the City University of New York.

Mr. Heilman has been a visiting professor at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv University. Mr. Heilman also writes a monthly column on the sociology of Jewry for the New York Jewish Week and is a frequent contributor to a number of magazines and newspapers. He has lectured at universities around the world, including Nanjing University in China.

The Morris Gelb Memorial Lecture is named in honor of the late Attorney Morris B. Gelb in tribute to his more than 50 years of community service and

his role in the development of The University of Scranton's Weinberg Judaic Studies Institute. His wife, Mae, has continued the family's civic and charitable endeavors.

The Gelbs were among the founders of the Judaic Studies Institute, which was created in 1979 through an endowment funded by the local Jewish community. The institute fosters an understanding and appreciation of Judaism, Israel, and their histories. It supports visits to the university by Jewish scholars, writers, and leaders and supports library acquisitions, publications, faculty research travel, and other scholarly endeavors. The work of the institute was further enhanced by a \$1 million gift from Harry Weinberg in 1990.

## Distinguished Sociologist Presents Guest Lecture

Dr. Gianfranco Poggi, a distinguished sociologist from the European Institute of Florence, Italy, was a guest lecturer in Professor John Pryle's sociological theory class on 19 March. Dr. Poggi's lecture focused on comparing and contrasting the major theories and ideas of Karl Marx with those of Max Weber – two well-known social theorists of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries.

Dr. Poggi has held teaching positions in sociology and political science at the University of Edinburgh, the University of Virginia, Stanford University and at the Wissenschaftskolleg zu Berlin, Germany. His teaching and research has centered around two main themes: the nature and development of modern political institutions, and the content and present significance of "classical" social theory. He has authored several books on classical social theory and his new book on Emile Durkheim will be published sometime later this year.

His current visit to the United States included a conference at the University of Chicago on European Studies and a visit to his daughter, Maria Johnson, Ph.D., Assistant Professor in the University's Department of Theology/Religious Studies.
