We are glad you are considering the University as your academic home for the next few years. We appreciate the chance to share a little about our recent accomplishments.


But first, here are a few things that distinguish us from other types of similar academic institutions and programs:



DEPARTMENT NEWS



The University of Scranton has released plans of a new building that our department will move to in the Fall of 2025. Faculty worked on plans throughout the semester to ensure the space will include the technology and software components needed for our academic research and outreach programs.

Want to study abroad in South Korea? This travel course, offered by the criminal justice department, covers the meaning of justice, security and crime in South Korea. Topics include global standards and patterns of justice, international law and transnational crime. Students will develop knowledge related to Korean systems and responses to crime, justice and security and compare them with those in the U.S. Students should plan to pay approximately \$4,022 to cover the costs associated with this travel course. Costs include airfare, ground transportation in the host country, visa, travel insurance, meals, lodging and entry to all planned cultural activities in country. Additionally, normal fees apply (approx. \$650).



Dr. Ismail Onat published an article in collaboration with **Dr. Mehmet Bastug**, where they analyzed how American adults' fear vary between Domestic and International terrorism. The article, "Deconstructing Fears of Terrorism: A Comparison between Fear from Domestic and International Terrorist Group" provides a significant contribution to the literature on the fear of terrorism topic by illustrating the important differences among general fears of terrorism, fears of domestic terrorist groups, and fears of international terrorist groups. He also hosted a 3 day seminar at the University on crime data to professionals who are passionate about leveraging data to enhance crime prevention and law enforcement strategies.

Dr. Michael Jenkins will travel to Chicago in March to receive the Outstanding Service Award from the Academy of Criminal Justice Science's Police Section. The award recognizes outstanding contributions to the Academy's largest section and, particularly, his service as editor of the Police Forum and for his mentorship of graduate students and junior colleagues in the field of policing.



Dr. Mehmet Bastug, in collaboration with **Dr. Ismail Onat** and **Dr. Ahmet Guler from Penn State University** recently published an article to the International Journal of Cybersecurity Intelligence & Cybercrime. The article, "Threat Construction and Framing of Cyberterrorism in the U.S. News Media", aims to explore the influence of news media on the fear of cyberterrorism and how cyberterrorism is framed in the media. The framing and portrayal of cyberterrorism in US newspapers are discussed.

Dr. Sinchul Back, the Director of Cybercrime Studies at the University, was recently promoted to associate professor. Dr. Back started working at the University in 2019. He is a dynamic instructor who teaches many different classes within the cybercrime and cybersecurity curriculum at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Since arriving at the University, Dr. Back designed and taught 8 different courses and was integral in the creation of the Department's undergraduate and graduate level cybercrime programs.
