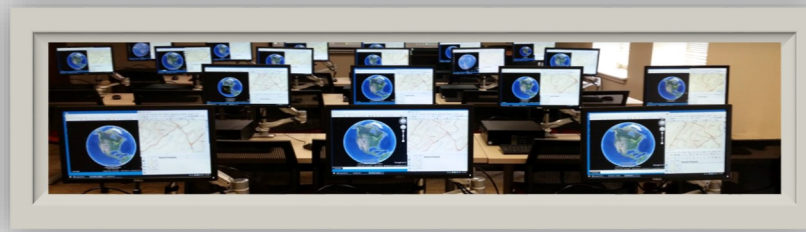

Sociology majors also have a strong background in writing, critical thinking, theory, and research.

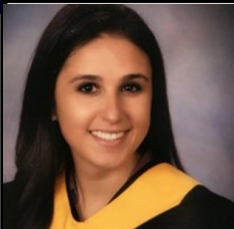

THE CENTER FOR THE ANALYSIS AND PREVENTION OF CRIME (CAPOC)

Students, faculty, and community partners have been busy since our department launched the Center for the Analysis and Prevention of Crime (CAPoC) this past summer. CAPoC's inaugural event was a training on creating and using evidence-based practice of 25 local criminal justice, behavioral health, and social service practitioners. Student Analysts are traveling to Washington, DC in May to give a congressional briefing on their analysis of burglaries for the Scranton Police Department and on their evaluation of a local law enforcement and first responder Crisis Intervention training. In the few months that CAPoC has been active, students have worked with faculty and community partners in hands-on learning experiences which will benefit them in future employment and educational opportunities—all while helping to improve the local community!

Victoria Spagnolo '17 is finishing her second semester at Northeastern University School of Law (NUSL). She is currently working on a year-long social justice project to assist an agency that offers free legal services to people struggling with debt. This summer, Victoria plans on applying for Northeastern's Immigration Justice Clinic where she will have the opportunity to represent clients in a variety of immigration matters. Then in the Fall, she hopes to work full-time with an immigration firm in New York City, through Northeastern's Cooperative Program. Based on work she began as an honors student at the University, Victoria presented at the annual meeting of the Western Society of Criminology in California. The paper, on Latino immigrants' views of the criminal justice, is co-authored with Dr. Jenkins and presently under review for publication with an academic journal.



Bradley Gilmore '08 Began his law enforcement career as a police dispatcher. He became a police officer in February 2011 with the Ridgefield Park Police Department in Bergen County, NJ. Bradley received extensive training in narcotics and trafficking trends which allowed him to lead the department in narcotic-related arrests. In September 2017, he was recruited by the Bergen County Prosecutors Office Narcotics Task Force and currently works as part of an elite and highly trained unit that targets drug smugglers on Interstate 95 and Interstate 80. Bradley also serves as the vice president of the New Jersey Narcotic Enforcement Officers Association and organizes law enforcement training throughout the state of New Jersey. He also trains law enforcement officers all over the country on aftermarket hidden compartments and drug trafficking trends for Street Cop Training, LLC. Bradley thanks The University of Scranton for providing him with the tools needed to succeed in life.

RECENT FACULTY ACHIEVEMENTS

Prof. David Friedrichs' co-authored book for Routledge's Key Thinkers in Criminology series has now been published as: David O. Friedrichs, Isabel Schoultz, and Aleksandra Jordanoska, *Edwin H. Sutherland* (London: Oxford, 2018). This is the first book to provide an overall review of the life, work and legacy of the most important criminologist of the twentieth century.

Dr. Ismail Onat published an article in the *Journal of Forensic Sciences & Criminal Investigation* on "Social Incivilities and Perception of Safety". He also authored an article on "Terrorism Risk Forecasting by Ideology" in the *European Journal on Criminal Policy and Research*.
