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Pope Francis's Vision for Civic and Political Love in the Context of Care for our Common Home

The Pope's vision is inspiring and should be utilized by all, several personal experiences and teachings further support his idea of using love to mend situations.

The book Divine Comedy by Dante Alighieri, discussed the main topic of love and how it can be used as a guide towards life. The way the author analyzed the love philia, has a direct correlation with Pope Francis' message of fraternal love. Pope Francis explains this in the following quote, "Jesus reminded us that we have God as our common Father and that this makes us brothers and sisters. Fraternal love can only be gratuitous; it can never be a means of repaying others for what they have done or will do for us. That is why it is possible to love our enemies" (Laudato Si, par 228). This friendship is proof of how important it is to show love towards others.

This lesson supports the Pope's vision because it shows the benefits received when working together. The message received from the movie The Mission directed by Roland Joffé, is another illustration of Pope Francis' vision of political love. This lesson can be compared to the relationship between Father Gabriel and the Guaraní and his relationship with Rodrigo. The love Father Gabriel had for these people, followed the Ignatian value, men and women for others. He made it his duty to live his life for others through the faith of God regardless of the differences he may have with them. The Guaraní were considered the outcast of Europe. Many believed they were incompetent and lacked human characteristics necessary to live a fulfilling life. As a result of these beliefs, the Guaraní were sold to into slavery to the superior Spanish officials. Luckily, Father Gabriel saw the Guaraní in a different perspective. He believed they were just as capable as any other individual. He decided to create a mission within the Guaraní residence to show his love towards them and the Lord. The relationship between them was successful and so was the creation of the mission. His love proved that a fusion of two lifestyles is possible despite the differences that may occur. Pope Francis further supports the blending of two lifestyles with the following quote, "Love for society and commitment to the common good are outstanding expressions of a charity which

affects not only relationships between individuals but also "macro-relationships" "(Laudato Si, par 231). It is important to recognize that there is always a point in life where we need help and are more victorious with the company of someone else. In addition, the bond between Father Gabriel and Rodrigo demonstrates the possibility of supporting an adversary. Prior to his work at the mission, Rodrigo was a sinner in the eyes of many after he killed his brother because of a shared love interest. Rodrigo was scarred from this experience and lived with guilt and depression. His actions forced him to be exiled for a period of time. His life slowly turned around after meeting Father Gabriel. Despite Rodrigo's reputation of being a murderer, Father Gabriel saw good in him. He asked him to join him in creating a mission with the Guaraní if he were to accept his penance. Rodrigo complied and joined him on creating the mission. Things slowly began to change for Rodrigo due to the offer he was given. He showed and received love from both the Guarani and Father Rodrigo regardless of what occurred in the past (murdering his brother and kidnapping the Guarani for slave trade). Furthermore, he turned his focus towards God and became a Jesuit. This transition of a lifestyle is significant when discussing the act of political love. There is so much good in showing love towards all types of people, it truly can go a long way. Regardless of our backgrounds / beliefs, we are all children of God. Love and respect do not discriminate, as we come from the same father. This connection should make relationships stronger and have us all unite for our common home.
