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
NEWS FROM OUR ALUMNI

DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures will relocate to O'Hara Hall in Fall 2001. It will occupy the entire third floor. Besides faculty and staff offices, the new location will include a part-time faculty and TA office; a library and conference room; a video room; a satellite room; a state-of-the-art language laboratory; and a copy room and kitchen area. Classes will be held in Hyland Hall. An open house will be held in September, 2001.

The sixth-annual Immersion Day was held on March 21, 2001. Sixty-six students attended from many different school districts, including Scranton High, Scranton Prep, Pocono Mountain, MMI, Abington, and Valley View.Of the 66 students, 24 were students in Spanish, 24 in French, 14 in German, and 4 in Italian.Several plays were performed, including "La seduta spiritica," based on the eponymous short story by Alberto Moravia, (Italian); and "El censo," a Mexi can comedy.

Dr. Robert Parsons was on sabbatical leave during the Spring semester.Dr. Linda Ledford-Miller was interim director.
