Kyle Strobel graduated from The University of Scranton's CMHC program in 2016, and is currently working as the Director of Counseling at The Office of Psychiatry and Counseling Services: Dr. Matthew Bergers, joining the practice in 2018 and stepping into his current role in 2020; Kyle was previously working with Geisinger, where he'd worked a variety of roles; helping to support clients struggling with substance abuse during his time at Geisinger Marworth, and with medical students through Geisinger's school of medicine. Kyle has varied experience in the following areas: sexuality/gender identity, anger management, depression, anxiety, as well as grief and loss issues. Kyle's primary goal working with clients is to assist them with their counseling needs, to help promote a healthy sense of well-being, and to gain insight into challenges by offering coping strategies. When it comes to therapeutic passions, Kyle incorporates animal therapy in his practice, previously running an animal therapy group while working inpatient and presently using animal assisted interventions to help closed off individuals open up through the course of counseling.
