

## Faculty Use of Turnitin.com

**These numbers are a best estimate based on the following factors:**

- Numbers of faculty who use Turnitin.com are from the statistics generated on the Turnitin.com website.
- Faculty who use Turnitin.com are able to do so via a Dropbox in the University's course management system.
- Some faculty, particularly in the Writing Department, use Turnitin.com as a teaching tool. They have all their students submit a *draft* of their papers via the Dropbox in their courses.
- Some faculty have all of their students submit their *final* papers via the Dropbox in their courses.
- Some faculty do not use the course management system. When they have a paper that they want to check for plagiarism, they submit the paper either to a librarian or to a staff member in the Center for Teaching and Learning (CTLE) to submit the paper and return the Originality Report to the faculty member.
- Some of the faculty who use Turnitin.com are adjunct faculty. It is difficult to calculate the number of adjunct faculty for an academic year because they vary by semester and because there are some full-time faculty members in one department who may be considered adjuncts in another department.

**Assessment:**

Prior to the 2013-2014 academic year, an average of 25% of the faculty used Turnitin.com. Although there was an increase of almost 18% over that average for 2013-2014; the Library did not offer any incentive during that time, nor did the Library conduct any publicity campaign to attract more users. The Library is in the early stages of planning an Academic Integrity Day on campus for students, faculty, and staff sometime during the 2014-2015 academic year.
