There are many options for graduate school:

Masters, Doctorate, and professional programs. Understanding your career goals and interests is key to choosing the right program.

Why Start Early?

- Application process can be time-consuming
- Completion of prerequisite courses / credits
- Registration for graduate examinations
- Compliance to application deadlines



Factors to Consider

- Will the program meet your professional and personal goals?
- Location and cost of living
- Cost of program
- Length of program
- Faculty
- Accreditations
- Career outcomes
- Rankings and reviews
- Opportunities for experiential learning (research, internships, clinicals, etc.)

When to Apply

Students should begin the graduate school search process by their junior year. Application deadlines vary by program—doctoral programs often have deadlines between the winters of junior and senior year, while master's program deadlines typically fall within senior year. While some schools offer rolling admissions, it is essential to check each program's specific deadlines to ensure timely submission.

APPLICATION CHECKLIST

Graduate school application requirements vary by university.

Ensure that all required materials are submitted on time.

Thoroughly proofread your documents for any grammatical or formatting errors, as even small mistakes can impact your chances of acceptance!

01. BUILDING SKILLS

Graduate schools value applicants with skillsets and experiences that are related to their programs. You can gain these by taking advantage of research, internships, and/or campus involvement.

02. PRE-REQ, COURSES

Graduate programs often require prerequisite undergraduate courses that provide an essential foundation for advanced study. Ensure you have/are completing these courses, which can be found on graduate programs' websites.

03. APPLICATIONS

Applications include sections 4-8 on this checklist and are often completed online, but some schools might require mailed materials. Be sure to review each program's requirements carefully. Pay attention to deadlines.

04. LETTERS OF REC

Letters of recommendation may come from professors, supervisors, or mentors who know you well and can speak to your qualifications and character. Request them early and provide key details for a strong letter.

05. TEST SCORES

Common tests are the GRE (including Subject Tests), GMAT, LSAT, and MCAT. Application deadlines will help you plan when to register, but do so in advance in order to 1) retake if necessary, and 2) send your scores to each school. Utilizing studying materials is recommended.

06. TRANSCRIPTS

Graduate programs require official or unofficial transcripts from your undergraduate university and high school. Order transcripts through your university's Registrar's Office. Contact your high school to obtain secondary transcripts.

07. ESSAYS

Graduate programs often require personal statements, statements of intent, and/or essays with specific prompts. Check out our <u>Personal Statement Writing Guide</u> to access helpful tips and templates.

08. RESUME/CV




Making the Match
